96TH GRAND IGLOO CONVENTION

Over 200 hardy Pioneers endured the elements to attend the 96th Grand Igloo Convention on the Kenai Peninsula. The wind and the rain buffeted the drivers and the fliers as they made their way south. Maybe Mother Nature was preparing us for the next Convention in Juneau and Kodiak in 2014.

Everyone was warmly greeted by members of the host Igloos as they arrived for Registration at the Soldotna Sports Center. The inclement weather was soon forgotten as old and new friends greeted one another.

Fortunately the hosts did not have to use the Ice Arena, which is very cool, for their meetings and were able to hold all their events in one large meeting room. The room was decorated with fish nets, cork lines and twinkling lights to create a great venue for all the events and the transition from meeting room to the luncheons, the Grand Ball and the banquet went very smoothly.

Thursday the Convention was officially opened by Dave Carey, President of Kenai Men's Igloo #33. After presentation of colors, Pledge of Allegiance, Invocation and the Alaska Flag Song, the Pioneers were welcomed by Pat Porter, the Mayor of Kenai, who brought a ray of sunshine (a large balloon of the sun) and Mike Navarre, Kenai Peninsula Borough Mayor.

A wonderful dance presentation by the Kenaitze Dancers entertained one and all before Grand President "Ozzie" Osborne was introduced to officially open the business session. Grand President Ozzie is a machinist and millwright by trade and has worked mostly in the oil fields since arriving in Alaska in 1968. He has six children, 22 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

All the Grand Officers, eight Past Presidents, and 215 delegates attended.

Grand Recorder, Linda Conley, reported that once again the membership of the Pioneers of Alaska has lost members with a net loss of 160 members for a total membership in 2012 of 5,026. Linda is a great resource for those seeking information on people who lived in Alaska in days gone by. She encouraged Igloos and individuals receiving requests for information to forward them to her.

The fourth time was a charm for the passage of the Constitutional Amendment giving women Pioneer members the opportunity to advance through the chairs of the Grand Igloo.

Past President, Al Clayton, Jr. once again inducted several new members into the Northern Chapter of the Order of the DairyAire and presented them with a custom-made T-Shirt attesting to their completion of the long and arduous trek to McCarthy to help clean out the McCarthy cemetery.

The dates for the next McCarthy Adventure are Thursday, July 11, 2013 through Sunday, July 14, 2013. This is the weekend before Golden Days in Fairbanks so it's the perfect opportunity to extend your travels and attend the fun events during Golden Days. At the Ladies Luncheon the ladies were treated to a skit on Homesteading by "Blazo Annie and "Honey Pot." They told of homesteading on the Peninsula and some of the unique names that came out of that era. Many of them are familiar to many of us—

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Moose Meat John, Pappy Walker, and Alaska Nellie to name a few.

While the ladies were dining the men were given a tour of the brewery at Nikiski. Past President Al was kind enough to bring back a sample jug of "water" that was rumored to taste a lot like India Pale Ale.

Sue Ellyn Novak, President of the Alaska Veteran's Museum in Anchorage was the speaker at the Men's Luncheon on Friday. A tour of the Kenai Visitor's Center was offered to the ladies at this time

Thursday night was Skit Night preceded by a spaghetti dinner put on by Anchorage Women's Igloo #4 members. Shawneen Conover, as Chairman, and her crew did a terrific job with the food.

Skit night is so much fun and we have some creative and talented members in our Organization. Fairbanks led off the evening of laughs with a skit "When Radio Was" and a take-off of the Abbott and Costello routine starring George Lounsbury as Costello, Mike Chace as Abbott, Gene Hanson as the Landlord, and Barbara Doogan as the Gold Digger. Everyone was trying to explain gold mining and the terminology to Costello and of course it was not successful but it lead to lots of laughs.

Palmer conducted the 11th Circus Court with Bonnie Tozer as "The Judge," Bill Church as the Bailiff and a cast of "law breakers" from the Palmer Women's Igloo. The 2013 Grand Igloo Convention will be in Juneau September 18-22 with a convention theme of "True Blue and Gold." They will celebrate the 100th anniversary of Men's Igloo #6 and will honor Patsy The Dog.
